As we look back on the past year, I'm filled with appreciation for all we've accomplished together. It's been a year of growth and change, and thanks to your support, we've continued to expand our impact and bring essential healthcare services to more people.

This year brought big changes that have made us stronger as an organization. We saw a 20% increase in primary care visits, thanks to a combination



of factors—including adding new staff, which allowed us to offer more appointments, and the continued trust our providers build with patients, leading to more referrals from friends, family, and other health systems. The addition of our pharmacy in 2023 has expanded access to essential medications for our patients and provided a new source of financial support for our services.

One of the biggest shifts this year was implementing the Epic Electronic Health Record system. This major upgrade now allows us to seamlessly coordinate care with the large health systems in our area, helping ensure patients receive more connected and comprehensive care.

We also faced financial challenges in fiscal year 2024, and we're on a path to stability. As part of our plan to strengthen our financial future, we've made the decision to sell the Venture Drive administrative office building. This move will put us in a stronger position long-term and allow us to focus more resources on direct services.

At the heart of everything we do is our dedicated team and the trust of our community. Every day, our staff goes above and beyond to provide compassionate, high-quality care, and we're constantly inspired by the strength and resilience of those we serve.

Looking ahead, we're committed to making healthcare more accessible and equitable. We'll continue to grow, adapt, and advocate for our community to ensure that no one is left behind.

Thank you for being part of this journey. Your generosity and commitment make all of this possible, and together, we're building a healthier, stronger future for everyone.

PACKARD HEALTH: "COMPASSIONATE, PATIENT-CENTERED, AND COMMUNITY-CENTERED"


In 1999, a neighbor introduced Rodney Smith and Janet Kemink, and the rest, as they say, is history. Rodney, a retired Emergency Medicine physician, and Janet, a retired nurse, built a life around caring for others. During their careers they cared for patients from all walks of life, seeing people at their most vulnerable.

Janet provided support for people frightened about their diagnosis and uncertain about what would come next. She guided them through their care plans with compassion and alleviated their fears.

Rodney often cared for patients who found themselves in the Emergency Department simply because they didn't have the means to seek regular medical care. Upon discharge, they were frequently referred to Packard Health for follow-up care. Many of these patients went on to develop trusted relationships with their Packard primary care providers.



Caring for these patients in the Emergency Department inspired Rodney to impart the human side of medicine to the residents he trained.



"One of the things I would tell residents is that your job is to figure out 'why' people come to the emergency department. When you're a resident, you think they came because of a complaint or acute illness. But if you really get to the answer to that question sometimes it's simply because it was the only time they could get a ride, or they couldn't miss work for a doctor's appointment."

Transitions in Care for Justice-Involved Populations

We are happy to announce that we received a \$500,000 grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) in November to increase access to high-quality primary care for people soon to be released from incarceration and reentering the community.

Nationally, as many as 80% of individuals returning to the community after incarceration have chronic medical, psychiatric, and/or substance use conditions. Researchers have reported that among individuals who are released from prison, opioid overdose is a leading cause of death with a risk more than ten-fold that of the general population. Individuals leaving incarceration also face many heightened health risks, including disproportionately higher rates of chronic conditions such as diabetes, hepatitis, and hypertension.

Working in partnership with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department, this grant allows us to support incarcerated individuals before their release, helping them manage health risks during reentry. This includes addressing the heightened risk of opioid overdose and ensuring continuity of care for chronic diseases by maintaining access to critical medications and treatment.

We are deeply committed to helping this vulnerable population receive the health care they need, ensuring a smoother transition and healthier reentry into our community.

Recuperative Care for Unhoused Patients

Imagine trying to recover from major surgery on a park bench. That was Brian's reality. At 58, he was discharged from the hospital after a below-knee amputation due to uncontrolled diabetes. A week later, he had a fever, worsening pain, and no wound care supplies. Without stable housing, he couldn't get home health services, refill his medications, or see a doctor. His recovery was at risk before it had even begun.

That's where the Recuperative Care Program comes in. Through a partnership with the Shelter Association of Washtenaw County (SAWC), Packard Health provides medical oversight and on-site nursing support while SAWC offers a



safe place for unhoused individuals to heal after medical crises. More than just a bed, this program offers compassionate care, medical support, and a path toward stability.

In 2024, we supported 33 patients, all facing serious health challenges. While in our care, they received:

- Medical attention and wound care
- Help getting medications and supplies
- Health education to manage their conditions
- Support in connecting to a Packard Health provider for ongoing care

This program keeps people out of the hospital and on the road to recovery, ensuring they don't fall through the cracks. For many, it's the first step toward lasting health and stability.

FRAN'S LEGACY: A GIFT THAT ENDURES

Fran Lyman was a remarkable woman whose life was full of adventure including teaching in a one-room school on Afrograk Island, Alaska, serving as a recreation director on an air base in Japan, and teaching in New Zealand on a Fullbright Exchange. She was always optimistic, always kind, always congenial, always generous.

During her lifetime, Fran supported her community in many ways. Her efforts to give back included serving on the Packard Community Clinic (now Packard Health) Board; she was a loyal donor thereafter.

While she gave generously to Packard throughout her lifetime, she also made provisions in her estate plan to benefit Packard. Since her passing in December, Fran's estate gift is helping ensure that those in her community receive the best possible primary and behavioral health care at Packard Health.
